

# **Six Nations police obstructed by Reclamation site supporters**

**Six Nations Reclamation site supporters prevented police from arresting the brother of a site spokeswoman last Friday morning when the man was caught speeding and driving without a license along Fourth Line.**

**The incident began when Haldimand OPP, who patrol the New Credit community adjacent to Six Nations, spotted a blue Dodge Caravan traveling on New Credit win speeds in excess of 150 km per hour.**

**OPP stopped the vehicle and were talking to the occupants when the driver put the vehicle in drive and drove off, fleeing onto Six Nations. OPP did not follow the car onto Six Nations.**

**Six Nations police spotted the vehicle on Third Line Road and Cayuga Road and attempted to stop it when the driver refused to pull over.**

**Police eventually stopped in on Fourth Line Road at Cayuga Road. The vehicle was occupied by a driver and four passengers. The driver refused to produced a driver's license, ownership or proof of insurance. All five occupants began shouting at Six Nations Police that they "had no jurisdiction" to arrest anyone and that the police "did not know the Great Law."**

**The occupants used cell phones and radios to call 13 more people to the scene who police said continued to interfere with Six Nations Police attempt to arrest the driver.**

**Police recognized the driver as Terrence Alan Jamieson, 39, who had a previous conviction for impaired driving causing death, in which a local woman was killed. Jamieson is a prohibited driver as a result of the conviction.**

**Six Nations police, in the interest of public safety and trying to de-escalate the situation advised Mr. Jamieson that he was not being arrested but will face criminal charges of prohibited driving and flight from police.**

**The other four occupants will be charged with Obstructing Police.**

**Six Nations Police Chief Glenn Lickers said Six Nations will "not become a haven for criminals."**

**Lickers said "the community as a whole has made it clear, that criminal behaviour cannot be tolerated, nor is Six Nations to be treated as a haven for individuals that commit offences elsewhere and then flee back here for refuge."**

**He said, "this kind of behaviour is confrontational and criminal. These types of incidents only increase the chances of a confrontation that will be detrimental to our entire community."**

**Lickers added, "Intimidation and threatening are tactics used to avoid being accountable for one's actions. They are criminal acts and will be treated as such."**

**Site spokeswoman Janie Jamieson would not comment on the incident.**
